While rehearsing his Christmas sermon he takes ill leaving Fitz to hear confessions. Recovers in time to give the actual sermon.

John Paul Fitzpatrick – The janitor - Played by Tommy Kilroy. A mishap leads to John Paul ending up in the confessional box but a rumour that the Pope is hearing confessions ensures that there is a queue. Realising there is no way out just yet he gives thought provoking messages while listening carefully to all their troubles.



Beulah Ravenscroft – The priest's housekeeper - Played by Martyn. Can spread a few rumours to keep the church full. Needs a new AGA and would do anything to get one.

Germaine Lawler – The village harlot - Played by Breege Kelly. After over forty years away from the church she decided to have the Pope hear her confessions on her return. Has a lot to get off her chest after all those years and tests Fitz' logical thinking.





Roberta Wheeler - Played by Cathy Flynn.

Roberta is the parish butcher's wife and an upstanding member of the community. As a regular at confessions she wants to personally welcome His Holiness. She has a hair appointment and is in a rush. She gives freely of her time to the Church on Thursday nights much to her husband's delight. First time performing with the group.

The Irish Angel – Played by Josephine Gillespie. Voice of an angel with a story to tell.



Farris – Played by Kevin Doherty. Farris is a busy young man in love. He would do anything for his girlfriend. He needs to find a job locally and Fitz might have the answer. First time performing with the group.



The widow Delaney – Played by Dolores O'Boyle. She confesses to loneliness and her lifelong regret at not telling her first true love how much she cared for him. Fitz has some advice and realisations as the widow recalls her life.



Shannon Bitterwhal — Played by Shauna O'Boyle. Coming from a family of eight, the arrival of a new baby brother causes problems for Shannon and a desire to be alone. Fitz gives her a different outlook. First time performing with the group.
